At about 4 a.m. on September 23, 1949, Patrolman Bayne while on duty at the 10th Precinct Station House was directed to proceed to the vicinity of 8th Avenue and West 20th Street, Manhattan, where an unknown man had been reported as firing several shots at another unknown man. As the patrolman arrived on the scene he observed a taxicab about to proceed with an unknown man in the rear of same who was acting in a suspicious manner. As the patrolman approached the taxicab to investigate, the door of taxicab was suddenly opened and the occupant of the rear seat pointed a pistol at the patrolman and discharged one shot at him. Patrolman Bayne then discharged his service revolver at the gunman, striking him in the right shoulder and causing him to fall back into the taxicab. Patrolman Bayne then entered the taxicab and removed the gunman to the street where after a struggle he disarmed him of a pistol and placed him under arrest. Prisoner had a previous criminal record.

Patrolman Robert R. Stewart, Shield No. 16823, 28th Precinct. At about 12:50 a.m., November 2, 1949, while off duty and in civilian clothes, upon entering his residence, a five story brick apartment house located at 426 East 155th Street, Bronx, officer became aware of smoke which he traced to an apartment on the ground floor. He forced the door, entered the smoke-filled apartment and led a man and his four children to safety. After summoning fire apparatus he returned to premises, entered his own apartment, by this time full of smoke and flames, and led his wife and two children to safety, in the meantime awakening other occupants. Due to the fire spreading rapidly the occupants of an adjoining apartment were unable to leave by fire escape. The officer directed them to proceed to the next apartment, arouse the occupants and escape through the latter apartment, which was done. The officer was informed that other occupants were still in their apartment, which was becoming enveloped in flames and smoke. He directed them to their end windows where a brick wall nine feet high and four inches wide joins the building. Patrolman Stewart climbed this wall, shimmied across it until he reached the building. The occupant then handed the officer his three children and he and his wife were also assisted to safety by the officer. Patrolman Stewart was on sick report for eight days as a result of smoke poisoning.

Patrolman Robert J. Nazzaro, Shield No. 5047, 43rd Precinct. At about 6:18 p.m., December 7, 1949, Patrolman Nazzaro, off duty in civilian clothes, observed two suspicious men enter a laundry at 2120 White Plains Avenue, Bronx, where they assaulted the proprietor while committing an armed robbery. Patrolman Nazzaro entered the premises and disarmed each of a loaded pistol and with the assistance of another patrolman who has been awarded in these Orders, placed both under arrest.

Acting Captain William J. Grafenecker, Detectives James M. Cashman, Shield No. 127, James M. Canavan, Shield No. 1801, Willard F. J. Shipsey, Shield No. 1135, William J. O'Sullivan, Shield No. 1415, James P. Malone, Shield No. 1797, and John A. McNichol, Shield No. 1946, District Attorney Squad, Manhattan, Detective Division. On July 25, 1949 and subsequent dates, after investigation, officers apprehended eleven persons who were operating a policy bank in the States of New York and New Jersey. These persons were instrumental in influencing a member of the Cincinnati Clearing House to the extent that the figures of stock transactions each day were rigged to serve their purposes.

Lieutenant John J. Bradt, Jr., 72nd Squad, Detective Division. At about 1:50 p.m., April 14, 1949, Lieutenant Bradt on duty in the vicinity of 14th Street and 5th Avenue, Brooklyn, observed and kept under surveillance four suspicious men in an automobile. Lieutenant Bradt encountered one of the men outside a tavern in the vicinity. The suspect attempted to draw a loaded gun but was quickly disarmed and taken into custody. The Lieutenant observed and apprehended two of the accomplices a short time later. Two detectives who have been awarded in these orders located and apprehended the fourth man, the operator of the car, about three hours later. These men had conspired to commit an armed robbery in the vicinity.

Lieutenant Victor M. Barkas, Patrolmen George Widmer, Jr., Shield No. 7737, 17th Precinct, and James E. Gardner, Shield No. 7105, 18th Precinct. At about 11:45 a.m., December 11, 1949, Lieutenant Barkas and Patrolman Gardner, off duty in civilian clothes, observed a demented man, armed with a knife, threatening a number of persons on the I.R.T. station at 3rd Avenue and 53rd Street, Manhattan. The man lunged at the officers with the knife several times. Patrolman Widmer on patrol duty, arrived at the scene a short time later. Lieutenant Barkas shot and wounded the armed thug in the left thigh as he made several thrusts in the direction of the officers. After a violent struggle, he was overpowered, disarmed and placed under arrest.

He pursued and captured the bandit, disarming him of the loaded weapon. The prisoner has a criminal record.

Acting Lieutenant Thomas F. A. McCabe, Detectives John S. Robb, Shield No. 420, William E. Kelly, Shield No. 1903, and Benjamin F. Page, Shield No. 67, 32nd Squad, Detective Division. On November 22, 1949, after intense investigation, officers apprehended a man who had fatally assaulted and raped a woman in

threatened a number of persons. Obtaining a description, they located the suspect in the vicinity of East 182nd Street and Prospect Avenue. When overtaken, the suspect attempted to stab Patrolman Gallagher. After a struggle, they disarmed him of the weapons and placed him under arrest. The prisoner has been committed to an institution for the insane.

Two accomplices were subsequently arrested. Another man who was the owner of the weapon used in the crime was also apprehended. These men had conspired to commit many other armed robberies.

With much interest, I read in last month's magazine the article "The Sky's Their Boat." I will recall the crash of the Navy dirigible "Akron" in 1933, when Sgt. Otto A. Kafka (now Captain) and Sgt. Joseph W. Forsythe, (now retired) landed their plane in the ocean to effect the daring rescue of seven men.



I also recall that they were cited by the PD and the Navy but medals were denied them by the Navy, because they were not in the Naval service. After leading the fight for recognition of these two officers, the Marine Park Civic Association decided to have its own medals struck off for them and in April 1938, the medals were presented in appropriate ceremonies at Floyd Bennett Field.

Furthermore, in March 1949, fifteen years after the incident, the belated awards from the Government were presented to these heroes by Rear Admiral Edward H. (Iceberg) Smith, in the office of P.C. O'Brien.

law by a representative from that board. The Juvenile Aid Bureau will discuss the treatment and disposition of children found in licensed premises. One other feature of the course will be a study of the laws and types of degeneracy and indecency. The Division of Licenses will give instruction on license requirements and police regulations including methods of inspection, reports and violations.

The course will be completed with specific instructions given by a magistrate on the preparation of court complaints, appearance before a grand jury and a study of court procedure.

The course as outlined, will prove of great value in giving the patrolman an intelligent approach to his work and concretely assist him in better serving the public.

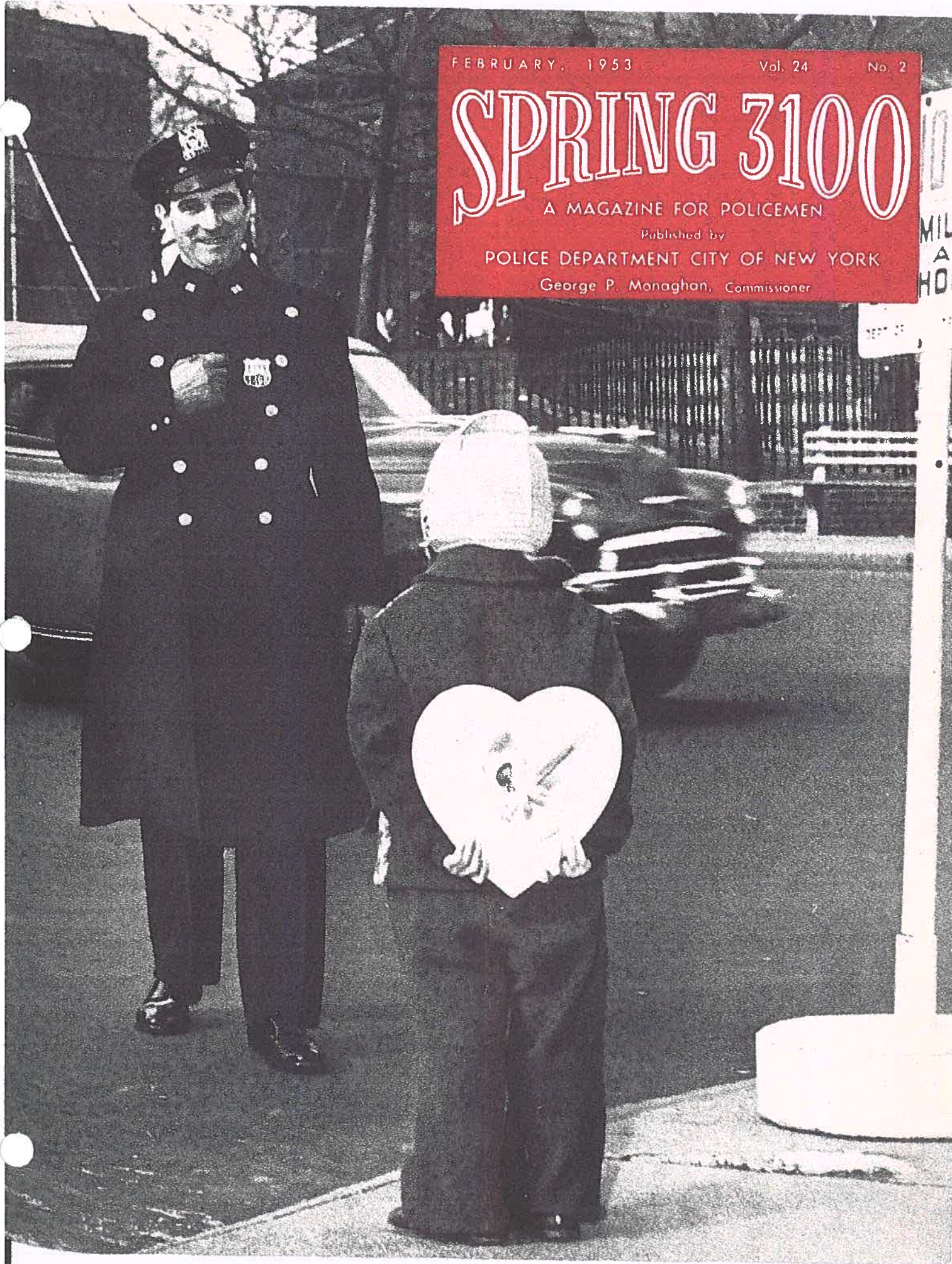

DEPARTMENTAL RECOGNITION

Departmental Recognition is awarded to the following members of the Force for meritorious conduct performed in the line of duty:

HONORABLE MENTION

Detective Robert F. Turner, Shield No. 2628, 16th Squad, Detective Division (was patrolman assigned to the 30th Precinct at time of occurrence). At about 3:40 a. m., April 7, 1956, on patrol, observed a man tampering with an auto at 125th Street and Morningside Avenue, Manhattan. The suspect fled at the officer's approach and during the ensuing pursuit he fired two shots at Patrolman Turner who returned the fire, fatally wounding his assailant.
