Most New York State operator's licenses expire on Sept. 30.

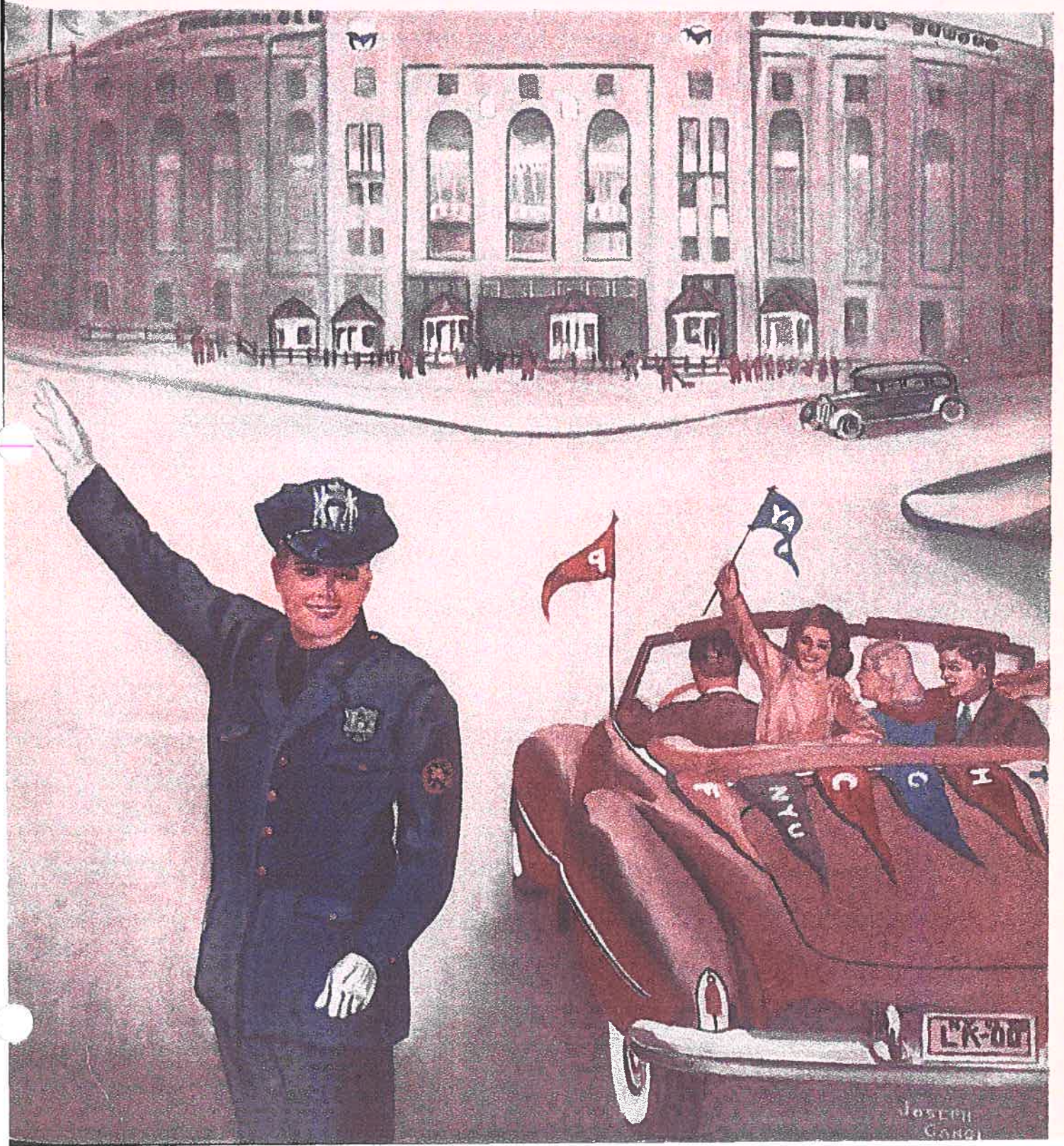

To avoid delays, operators are urged to sign each application in three places and enclose the present renewal stub along with a check or money order for \$1.50 for each license, payable to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

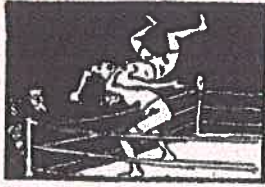

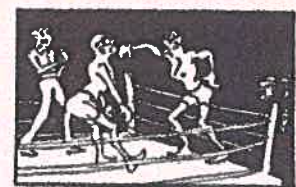

PISTOL TEAM WINS TROPHIES

THE NEW YORK CITY Police Department's Pistol Team continued to outshoot the best competition in the United States at the 18th Annual International Pistol Tournament, sponsored by the New York Mirror, at Teaneck, New Jersey, August 18 to 21. Members of the department won five contests and captured most of the major trophies including the William Randolph Hearst and James W. Gerard Trophies.

Patrolman Herman Hunter, P.A., led the victory parade by copping the James W. Gerard Trophy. This prize sponsored by Mr. Gerard, former ambassador to

Germany, is presented to the man scoring the highest score in the Police Individual Match No. 2, .38 cal. at 25 yards. In order to win, Patrolman Hunter shot an absolutely perfect score of 300 (30x). He was followed by Agent John Brownfield, FBI, N. Y., who shot 300 (29x).

The other outstanding trophy, the W. R. Hearst trophy was garnered by Patrolman Charles Popp, 22nd Pct., a newcomer to the P.D. team. Popp accomplished this feat by outshooting the best of the U. S. Marines, the F.B.I. and other formidable agencies across the nation. Popp's score of 295 obviated the necessity of a second round for his competitors. Closest

to him was Sgt. Victor Sargent, 26th Pct., who hit a 293.

In Match No. 1, (4-man police teams) the U. S. Marines outscored our team by two points, 1194 to 1192.

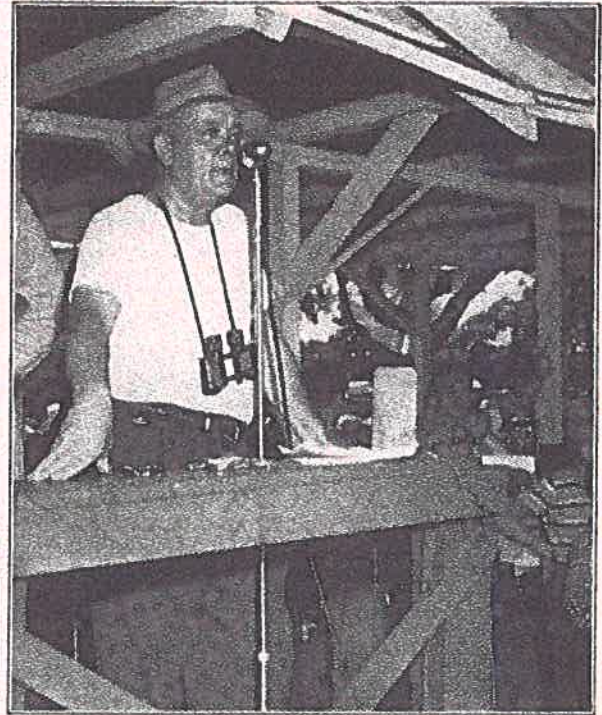
The Marines also captured Match No. 5, Teaneck Police Qualification match. Again the P. D. entry was nosed out in spite of shooting a near perfect score. Acting Sgt. Mark Walsh did a 300 (28x) to the winning Marine Sgt. M. Billings' 300 (30x).

There were four policewomen entered, Adelaide Knowles, Vera Franolick, Dorothy Smith and Marion Bushey. Plw. Knowles came near defeating the women's champion, Alice Matthews of Bromall, Pennsylvania, who retained her championship gained last year. The score was 298 to 295.

Sgt. Conrad Jensen, M.E. and Sgt. Frank Lantay, 111th Pct. teamed up in Match No. 10, (two-man .38 cal. match) and defeated the Marines with a score of 598 to 597.

Match No. 11, competition for ranking police officers, went to Sgt. Victor Sargent in defeating Corporal Clark Ellis, Wilmington, Delaware P.D. Both scored 300 with Sargent getting 24x to Clark's 23x.

In the twelfth and final match of the tournament, (4-man .45 cal. teams) the Police Department team, of Ptl. Mario Ganci, 67th Pct., Ptl. Herman Hunter, P.A.; Acting Sgt. Victor Sargent, 26th Pct., and Acting Sgt. Mark Walsh, P.A., fired for a total of 1182. In this match, they were outscored by the Marines who again scored two more points with a total of 1184.

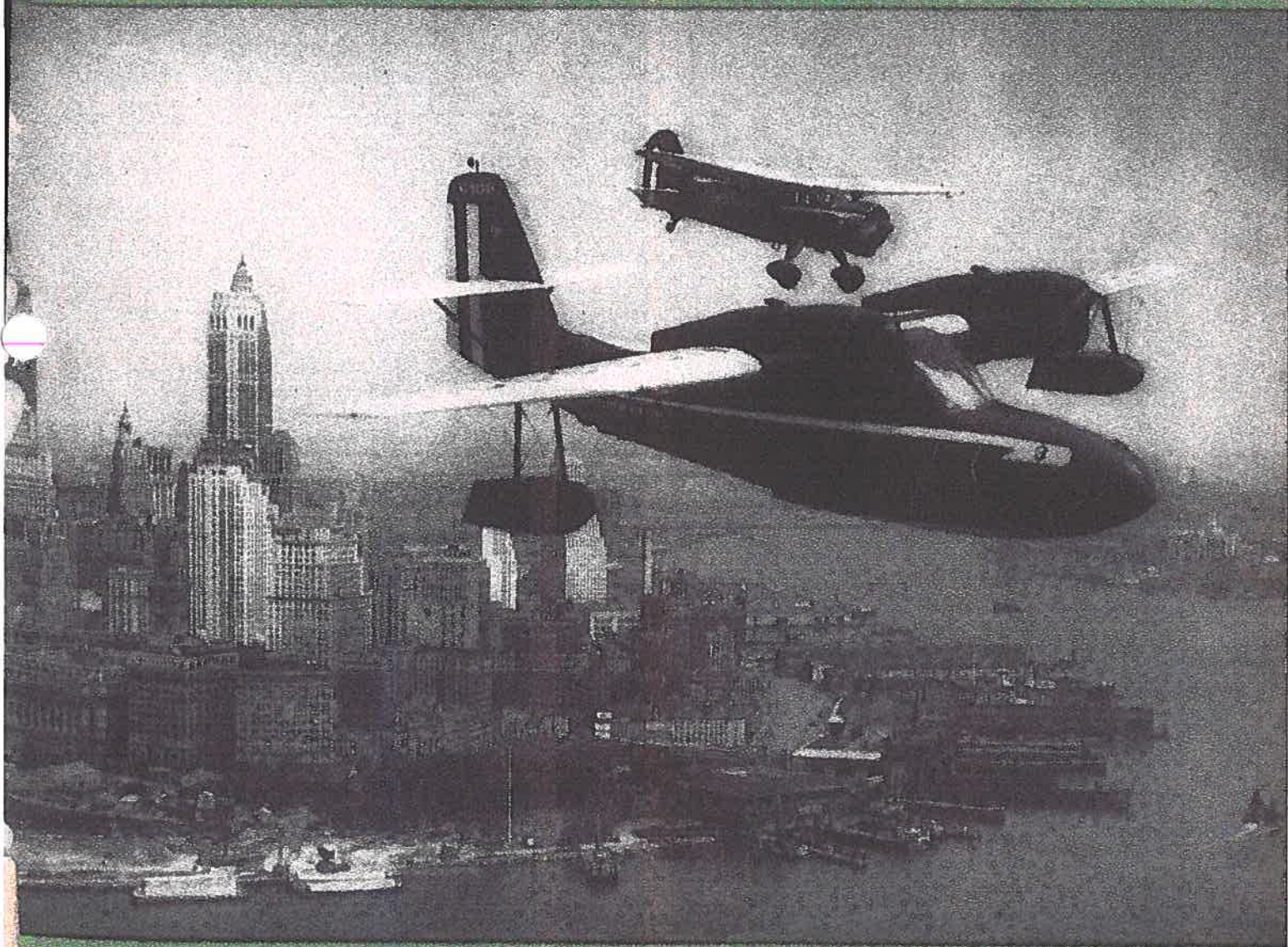

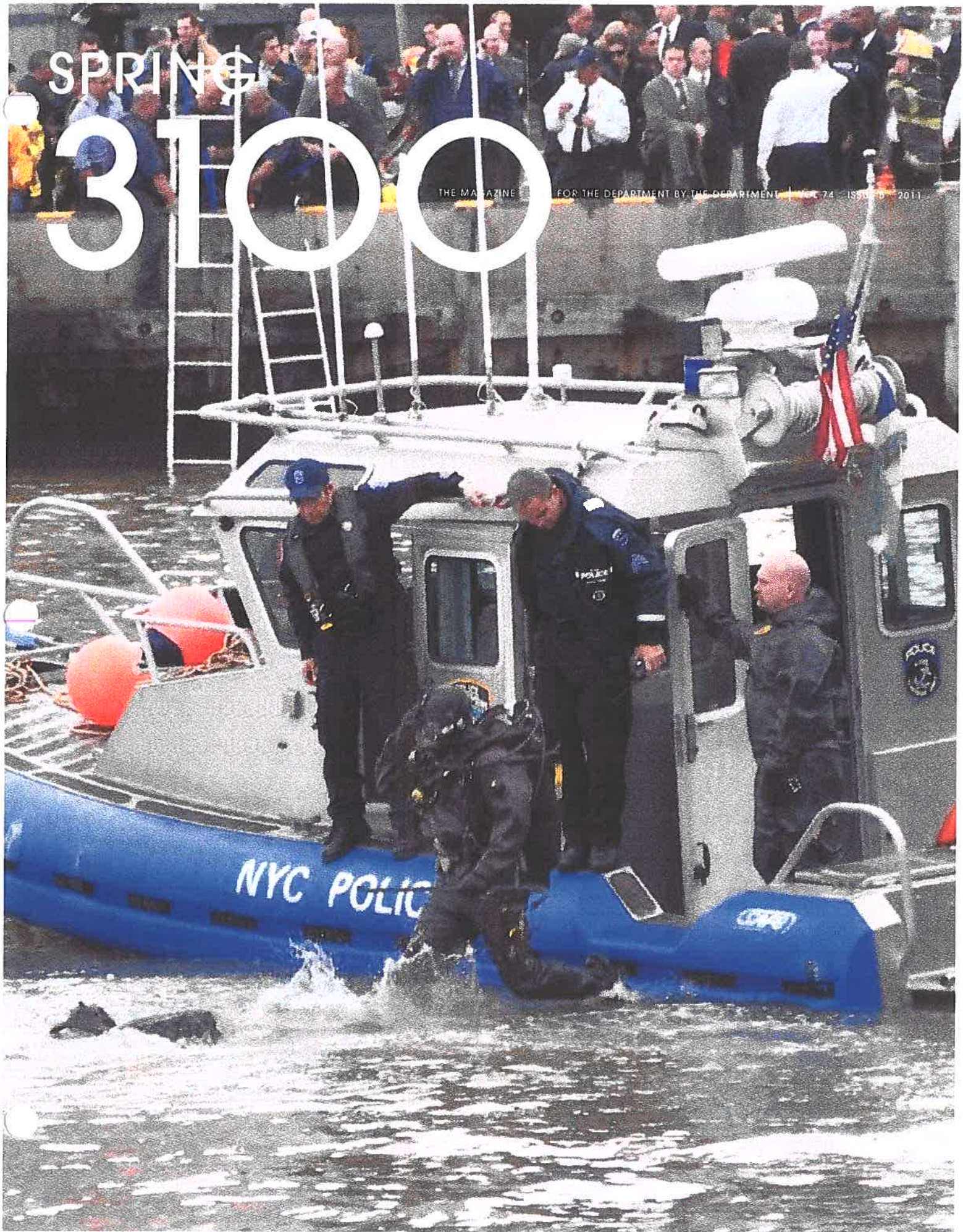

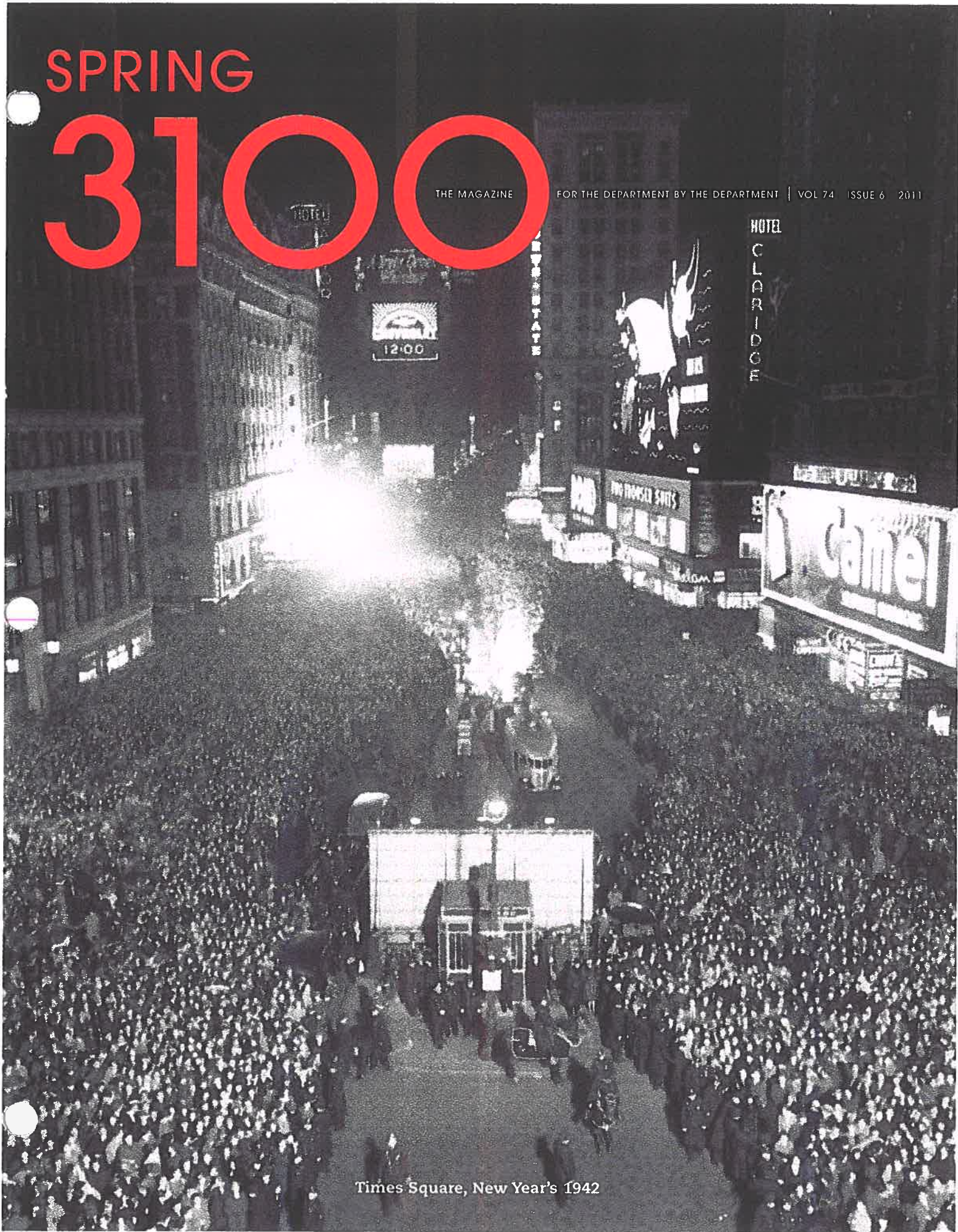
